## INFORMATION WE PROVIDE:

- The nature and consequences of the charge(s) service users are facing.
- The rights, responsibilities and options of the service user under the law including alternative justice processes.
- Information on Court procedures
- Disposition or direction given by the court or community to the offender.
- Appropriate resources to enable service users to address the underlying problems (ie housing challenges, mental health, addictions etc), which contribute to their charges. When appropriate the Courtworker will follow-up on these referrals.



#### In the Community:

- Courtworkers can conduct public legal education workshops for the Indigenous community.
- Courtworkers can aid in the development of preventive programs to reduce the crime rates in their communities.

#### The Indigenous Criminal Courtworker will NOT:

- Provide legal advice
- Act as a language interpreter for the court
- Act as a probation officer
- Select a lawyer for their clients, BUT will provide a list of lawyers.

### SERVICES WE PROVIDE:

- Liaising between service users and criminal justice personnel to help overcome communication barriers (may include being able to provide appropriate information to the court and/or speaking on behalf of the accused).
- Informing justice officials about concerns of the Indigenous community and the perspective of Indigenous alleged accused.
- Promote understanding within the Indigenous community of the existing criminal justice system.
